

- Started in the 1990's
- 6 or 7 local groups including City of Winnipeg, Province of Manitoba, Institute of Urban Studies
- Measure demographic shifts over time using consistent geographic boundaries, definitions, and crosstabulations

Benefits of Collaborative Model and Non-Profit Lead

- Ability to share costs and invoice various departments, organizations, and levels of government
- Province and City coordination on geographies
- Access for smaller non-profit organizations
- Peer-led training, information sharing

Challenges

- Differences in data capacity and managing make-up of consortium meetings (administrators, data users)
- Departmental re-organizations
- Promoting and supporting data use within and outside of membership



<u>The Gap</u>

Currently there is no one place where organizations/agencies can easily and inexpensively find the *wide range of detailed neighborhood and local-level information* they require to support their programs and engage the public.








Identifying Pedestrian and Cycling Injuries in relation to Income








Identify the Location and Size of Populations we Serve






Implementation Realities

- No dedicated budget
 - In-kind contributions only source funding
- Limited window for initial roll-out
 - Health and social landscape is changing rapidly in Manitoba

Implementation Approach

Prototype Quickly .. Fail Fast



Implementation Approach

- Build to "end-game" quickly
 - Initial and "modest" prototype launched by April 2018
 - Design, build and deploy in 3 months
 - Allows us to learn quickly what is needed is needed in terms of technology, resources, project mgm't and governance
- Management/Governance Lite
 - Minimal focus on governance and terms of reference at project initiation as we don't have the time and the resources to focus on these on the front-end
 - Once initial portal is launched, solidify the project organizationally
 - Long-term governance and organizational structure
 - Long-term sustainability


Implementation Approach





A Collective Impact Approach



Collective Impact is a framework to tackle deeply entrenched and complex social problems. It is an innovative and structured approach to making collaboration work across government, business, philanthropy, non-profit organisations and citizens to achieve significant and lasting social change.

Social Planning Council of Winnipeg

- Backbone Organization
 - Provides project support and coordination
 - Convenes meetings
 - Hosts portal web-site
 - Main and most visible project champion

A defining feature of the Collective Impact approach is the role of **a backbone organization** – a separate organization dedicated to coordinating the various dimensions and collaborators involved in the initiative. Supporting backbone infrastructure is essential to ensuring the collective impact effort maintains momentum and facilitates impact.



Groups of people who share a concern or a passion for something they do and learn how to do it better as they interact regularly




COPs develop a shared repertoire of resources which can include stories, helpful tools, experiences, stories, ways of handling typical problems, etc.

Community of Practice

- Hands on technical support
 - Core data products, data set preparation, tool-set development, data documentation standards
- Critically reviews portal versions(1st line of critique) as they are developed
- Addresses implementation issues as these arise
- Facilitates joint learning and capacity development around how to develop and mobilize community data
- Acts as Project Champions
- Advises Steering Committee



Project Timelines

- Jan March 2018:
 - Design, build, and test initial Prototype under Steering Committee oversight and feedback from Community of Practice
- April, 2018:
 - Soft-launch, locally and nationally
- May Dec. 2018:
 - Promote the portal locally
 - Hands-on training of early adopters / champions
 - SPCW is hiring a summer student to build out a training strategy
 - Actively promoting to Public Health Staff within the WRHA
 - Build out formalized evaluation /feedback strategy, and modify the portal as resources allow
 - Build out additional Knowledge Portals
 - Explore short and long-term governance and sustainable business models




We are wondering

- Is our \$0, emergent, and collaborative roll-out approach sustainable over time?
 - will in-kind contributions be sufficient to allow the MBCDP to evolve
 - In the current environment, can the project attract additional resources
 - Can we create a process to disseminate the technical skills to maintain the portal among project partners
- Is the MBCDP actually providing useful information to end-users
- Will our Community of Practice become actively engaged in the continued development of the MBCDP

An advantage we have is that it costs very little to maintain the MBCDP in its current form around \$1500 per year for cloud based services
